18th to 26th. Hanukkah is often referred to as the Festival of Lights as they light their Menorah.







General Hospital to entice visitors and staff. The plants were such a best seller that two other members brought in succulents and phlox. These quickly sold out as well.

But our plant selling days were not yet over. A couple in the community became involved and gave us an abundance of cucumber and tomato plants. In August we were gifted with more succulents as well as lemon balm plants.

A HISTORY LESSON

Highlights in the development of the British Columbia Association of Hospital Auxiliaries.

An organization known as the Women's Auxiliary to the British Columbia Hospital's Association existed in the 1940's.

On June 5, 1945, a meeting of representatives from women's auxiliaries to hospitals in the vicinity of Greater Vancouver was held. It was proposed that the women's auxiliaries to hospitals in B.C. form an organization of their own, apart from, but in affiliation with the British Columbia Hospitals' Association.

On November 21, 1945, the Annual Meeting of the women's auxiliaries to B.C. was held in Vancouver. At this meeting the first constitution was read and adopted. The name of the new organization was "Women's Hospital Aids Association of the Province of British Columbia". The purpose of this organization was to be to facilitate the exchange of ideas and to act as an advisory body to affiliated groups.

Thus, the provincial association was born.
