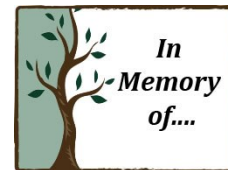

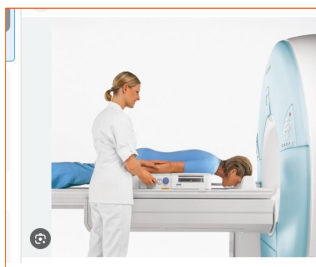

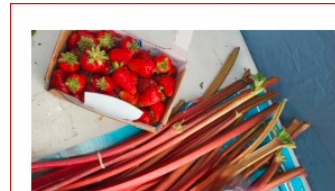

Rhubarb Strawberry Crisp

A great spring-time early summer dessert.
 Bake 350-degree oven 55 minutes

Filling

1lb Rhubarb sliced 1/2" pieces

1/2 lb Strawberries hulled and quartered

1/2c Sugar

1.5 teaspoon cornstarch

1 teaspoon vanilla

Topping*

1/2 cup flour

1 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup butter

1 cup large flake oats

4 tablespoons sugar

*This is double the written recipe, but I like a lot of topping. You can half this if you wish less topping

*Optional 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Toss filling ingredients together until no white remains.

Place in 4 quart oven proof dish

(8"round will work)

Mix dry ingredients

Cut in butter until resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle on top of the fruit.

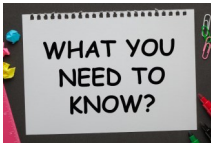
Bake 55 minutes in 350-degree oven

IS YOUR HOUSE IN ORDER?



A SURPRISE THRIFT STORE INSPECTION

The Kamloops Auxiliary Thrift Store had a surprise visit from a government inspector. He said that they had the best organized Thrift Store in Kamloops. He was very happy with how they were following the rules. He wrote them up for one infraction though...he found a hoodie with a drawstring in with the kids' clothing. The auxiliary pointed out to him that the hoodie was a grad hoodie (usually worn by a 17 or 18 year old), so would not be classed as a child's and most likely was put there by a customer.

The inspector classed children's clothing as age 16 and under, but because the hoodie was on the kids' rack, it was an infraction...no fine, just a warning. Fines can be \$500.00 for each infraction. The auxiliary put that hoodie with the adult clothing so the inspector was happy with that. He was very happy that child seats, chairs, etc. or window blinds were not accepted. The inspector was pleased that they labelled all their packaged kids' toys with the choking hazard stickers. He did say there was a new "toy" added to the banned list...the small sponge items that expand when put into water. Children had choked on them. The person in their auxiliary who does the toys never put them out anyway. The government inspector also said that since COVID there is a new regulation regarding cosmetics. Any cosmetics including nail polish that has been used can no longer be sold.

The seals can be broken (or opened) as long as they are not used. Since it was a new regulation they were removed from the shelves and disposed of. The auxiliary could not give them away either.

They checked to make sure there were no items "hiding" in the kids' department that might have been missed like items with draw strings or ribbons that go around the neck (hats, bibs, clothing, etc.) A few with strings were found a couple and were cut off or removed. As a team, the auxiliary volunteers will have to be diligent in making sure that they move any adult clothing that customers might have put on the children's racks.

Everyone working in the thrift store who processes & puts clothing, toys and cosmetics out will be reminded of the rules.

Long website address – yes, but a very important one which every Thrift Store should be aware of. On this website are the Health Canada rules and regulations to selling a number of items. There are items on this list that we should not be selling in our Thrift Stores and there are items which should only be sold if you meet all the requirements.

"If you manufacture, import into Canada, advertise or sell consumer products, you are responsible for being familiar with the applicable requirements set out in the regulations."

Some items that are regulated :

Cosmetics

Children's sleepwear

Cradles/cribs/bassinet

Playpens, safety gates, Toy Boxes

Car and Booster Seats, Carriages and Strollers

Corded Window Coverings

High chairs are allowed to be sold if they meet the current requirements

ASTM F404 Standard Consumer Safety Specification. How many of us are up on those requirements?

If you sell these items in your store you are taking on a high liability risk which could result in fines from the Government of Canada or even worse, facing a lawsuit if someone is injured by a product purchased in your store.

If you own your building and carry separate insurance, we strongly suggest you contact them to see if you are covered as more and more insurance companies will not issue coverage if you are selling items regulated by Health Canada.

BCAHA takes a "better safe, than sorry" approach to not selling these items as we are not expert in this field and have no idea if a product has been recalled or if there are any safety features missing from an item and in most cases we do not get the manual that comes with new retail items, outlining the safety features.

We understand that most of our members are aware and follow these guidelines but we have noticed on Facebook that some auxiliaries are still choosing to sell some of these items.

You should have a copy of the rules in your store, front and center so anyone can check an item as it comes into your donation area.

"If you are unsure, do not sell it and do not give it away"

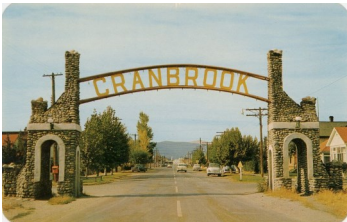


East Kootenay Area – Originating Auxiliaries

Cranbrook & District Hospital Auxiliary

Formed from the already flourishing Cranbrook Ladies Aid Society of St. Eugene Hospital (1901).

With the construction of the new hospital (1968), they changed their name to Cranbrook & District Hospital Auxiliary.



Invermere Hospital Auxiliary

After a primitive start in Wilmer, BC (1910), a new hospital was built in Windermere, BC (1914).

Over the years, several auxiliaries were formed in nearby communities. By 1977, they came to be known as the Invermere Hospital Auxiliary.

They have been proudly serving for 112 years! Currently a member of Okanagan Mainline District.



Sparwood General Hospital Auxiliary

First formed as the Michel Natal District Hospital Auxiliary in 1953, the members changed their name when the new hospital was completed in 1978.



Windermere Ladies Hospital Auxiliary

Starting small in 1949, they first supported the hospital in Invermere. Upon completion of the new Windermere Hospital in 1956, they simply carried on with successful and ambitious goals!



Golden Hospital Auxiliary/Parson Hospital Aid

The first Hospital Ladies Aid was formed in 1927. Then, a second group was formed in 1960.

Sadly, it was disbanded in 2022.



Kimberley Hospital Auxiliary

Proudly formed in 1953, despite significant resistance from the existing Hospital Board (Cominco) – “the hospital will never be the same!”.

Elkford Diagnostic Centre Auxiliary

Formed in 1979 to raise funds for the Pediatric Ward of the future hospital in Elkford.

The first Ladies Hospital Auxiliary was formed in 1925. Following WW II, the second auxiliary was organized and resumed their work in 1948.

In late August the Ladysmith Auxiliary put on an Artistic Event at their Thrift Store! What a great idea for future fundraisers!



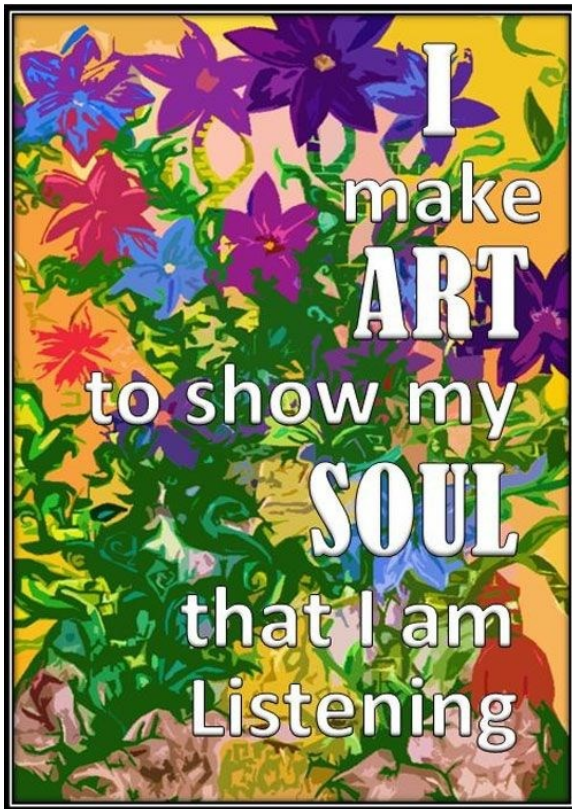
