I hope you are already making plans to celebrate **Auxiliary Day** on May 10th.



IN FT ST JOHN

The Fort St John Hospital Auxiliary celebrated our 90th Anniversary February 2022 and kicked off activities with a complimentary Staff Appreciation Breakfast sandwich, following purchasing extravaganza with the the Auxiliary has as the adjacent Peace Villa under our care. 

IN DELTA—A 3 MILLION DOLLAR DONATION



The 'blue coats' have done it again!

On Monday, members of the Delta Hospital Auxiliary Society (DHAS) made a record \$3 million donation to the Delta Hospital and Community Health Foundation's (DHCH Foundation) 'Coming Home' Campaign. The donation is the latest major contribution to the Foundation's \$18.25 million campaign for a new long-term care community and is one of the largest gifts ever received from a hospital auxiliary in the province. The DHAS has been providing volunteer services, patient care and comfort and funding from their entrepreneurial efforts to Delta Hospital since 1969. As one of B.C.'s most successful hospital auxiliaries, the DHAS has more than 300 dedicated volunteers who donate nearly 60,000 hours each year, working at the Auxiliary's businesses - Dogwood Gift Shop, Courtyard Café, the Delta Auxiliary Thrift Store and Lifeline – all wearing their famous blue coats and cheerful smiles as they represent the community with pride.

IN GRAND FORKS



First formed in 1946 with a membership of ten, the Grand Forks Hospital Auxiliary was incorporated as a non-profit society in 1981, and has grown to include a current volunteer base of approximately 90 members. Our purpose is to raise funds in support of our local hospital, as well as for other health-related programs within the Boundary and West Kootenay areas of the Interior Health Region

Our fundraising efforts centre around the operation of our Thrift Store, located at 7239 2nd Street, in Downtown Grand Forks. All store inventory comes from the generous donations we receive from the community, whether it be from private citizens or local businesses. We whole-heartedly acknowledge that we could not achieve the fundraising levels we do if it were not for the amazing support we receive through these donations, as well as through the customer loyalty we enjoy in the shop.

Since 2000, the Auxiliary has regularly posted a running total of all monies raised through the operation of our store. We are extremely pleased to announce that in November 2023 we surpassed the \$3 million mark, a milestone the entire community can be proud of.

The money is made available to the Hospital for equipment purchases in response to an annual "wish list" forwarded to us by the hospital's administration. We try to accommodate as much of the list as we can each year, knowing that the new equipment will be used for significant improvements to patient care and comfort at Boundary Hospital. In 2023, for example, we were able to fund \$177,000 for the highest-priority requests.

In addition to enhancements at our own local hospital here in Grand Forks, we also consider requests for funds from other regional facilities and programs. In 2023 for instance, we were able to contribute \$25,000 to Trail Hospital's "Orthopaedic Enhancement Program" for improvements to its surgery and operating suites, and in 2022 a significant donation was made to its post-natal unit: Both units being heavily utilized by patients from our area, and the broader region.

As well in 2023, we were very pleased to contribute \$5000 to the recently-formed Kootenay Emergency Response Physicians Association (KERPA), a BC Government accredited unit headquartered in Nel-

son. KERPA's mandate is to facilitate on-site physician attendance at critical trauma incidents such as traffic accidents, as well as other medical emergencies, and on a volunteer basis.

- We participate in the annual "Coats for Kids"
 drive. In addition to donating warm winter coats
 and jackets, we also supply hats, mitts, gloves, and
 scarves for distribution by local organizers.
- Each year, we provide scholarships to Grand Forks and Midway High School graduates who plan to study in a health-related field.
- In consultation with local service providers, we assist with store vouchers to help fire victims and those sheltering from domestic abuse.
- -We operate the hospital "Gift Bar," a tiny satellite gift-and-thrift located in the Hospital's main reception area.
- At Christmastime, we donate money towards the purchase of Christmas care/gift packages for our residents in long-term care facilities, and we decorate the hospital for the holidays.
- We recycle: Unsold t-shirts are up-cycled into shopping bags for our customers; unusable cotton garments are cut up for rags, which are purchased by several of our local businesses; and some metals and materials that would otherwise be thrown out are set aside for reinvention by local artisans.

it is inspiring to know that with the continued support of this remarkable community, our local and regional hospitals and the people they serve will benefit from our collective efforts long into the future.

HISTORY LESSON #5

THE LOWER MAINLAND PART I:

Auxiliary to the Arthritis Society

The Women's Auxiliary to the Canadian Arthritis & Rheumatism Society was formed in 1950. They provided services to assist the Society's Treatment & Educational Programme.

In 1960 the Blue Bird Shop was opened on Seymour Street to sell handicrafts which had been made by the patients throughout the year. From 1965 to 1985, they were instrumental in raising funds for the Rufus Gibbs Lodge to accommodate patients from out of town. Patients were then moved to Easter Seal House.

The Auxiliary to Burnaby Hospital

From seven groups (auxiliaries) in 1943, they amalgamated into two – North & South. The long-awaited hospital was opened in 1952. They provided Library services, organized the Candy Stripper programme and assisted with Blood Donor Clinics. By 1968, the two groups became the Ladies Auxiliary to Burnaby General Hospital. A further name change came in 1983, when they became incorporated under the Societies Act as the Auxiliary to Burnaby Hospital.

Auxiliary to Children's Hospital

From 1979 to 1981, and after much planning, it was resolved that the previous two auxiliaries would disband and be reestablish themselves under the Societies Act as the 'Auxiliary to Children's Hospital'.

Delta Hospital Auxiliary

Formed in 1969, with eight chapters in the Ladner and Tsawwassen area. They amalgamated in 1980 into four units – Gift Shop, Hospital Volunteers, Thrift Shop and Ways & Means.

Why Be A Volunteer?

It's not for the money, it's not for the fame and it's not for any personal gain.

It's just for the love of fellow man.

It's just to lend a helping hand.

It's just to give a little of self.

That's something you can't buy with wealth.

It's not the medals worn with pride.

It just for that feeling deep inside.

That what makes you a VOLUNTEER.
