

NEWS FROM TRAIL— Across the Pond and Back! A grateful visitor pays it back to the Trail hospital

A recent act of kindness is warming hearts across the Kootenays, thanks to one very grateful visitor from the UK and a dedicated team of volunteers at the Kootenay Boundary Regional Hospital (KBRH) in Trail. Anita Fricke, secretary of the Trail Hospital Auxiliary, told the Trail Times that a woman visiting family in Castlegar ended up spending much of her vacation at KBRH — definitely not what she had planned. Despite the circumstances, she was struck by the exceptional care she received from the physicians and staff, as well as the warm hospitality found in the hospital's Gift Shop.

"She made several visits to the Gift Shop during her recovery and was genuinely impressed by the variety and quality of merchandise," said Fricke. "She even asked one of our volunteers if the shop would accept hand-knitted items as a thank-you once she returned to the UK." True to her word, about a month later, the Gift Shop received a large parcel from overseas.

Inside were lovingly crafted baby sets — small blankets paired with matching toques and booties — along with several colourful afghans. "The craftsmanship is beautiful," Fricke shared. "It's clear these pieces took months of work. It was such a generous and heartfelt gesture." This story is a powerful example of kindness coming full circle. What began as quality medical care and simple human compassion became a cross-continental expression of gratitude — proof that generosity knows no borders. The Trail Hospital Auxiliary would like to extend a big thank you to this thoughtful donor, Fricke said, and to all the physicians, staff, and volunteers who make KBRH a place of care, comfort, and connection. For those inspired by this story, Fricke encourages locals to consider volunteering.

"We're always looking for helping hands," she said. "Come be part of something meaningful." Applications are available at the Gift Shop, and volunteers can assist there or in the Cast Clinic or Colpo Clinic.

Summerland Health Care Auxiliary Health & Safety

Health & Safety falls under the leadership of 2nd Vice President. Our Health & Safety group is made up of volunteers from our regular membership. The mission of our group is to look at, review and correct any safety issues in the shop. We have seen many positive changes to the safety side and are always looking for anything that may benefit the physical and mental health of our volunteers. Here is a list of items/suggestions that the Health & Safety committee completes. The committee meets every 2 months or as required.

- Defibrillator, ensuring it is kept charged and in running order. An annual defibrillator training session is setup for volunteers, hosted by the Summerland Fire Dept.
- -First aid kit(s) are kept inventoried and stocked.
- -Incident reports are reviewed by the Health & Safety committee, to ensure completion of the reports, as well as any follow up.
- -checking the Thrift shop surroundings and correcting anything that may pose a Safety or Health risk to our volunteers. Example: floor mats, hooks, step ladders to name a few.
- -a suggestion box was setup for volunteers to bring to the committee's attention any items that may require a follow up. All suggestions are reviewed, fixed and reported at the monthly general meetings.
- -sanitization of the water cooler, every 3 months.
- -911 procedure lists were setup at each phone at the Thrift store, to ensure our volunteers calling 911 have the address etc. at their fingertips.
- a Health & Safety bulletin board was setup to post information pertaining to Health & Safety, brochures of upcoming events (example: memory cafes, diabetic workshops) there is also tips posted regarding safety (example: how to lift, preventing falls from ladders etc.) A list of the Health & Safety committee members is also posted on the board.
- -making sure the work areas are kept clutter free
- -Follow the Code of Conduct while performing our duties.
- -attached are documents used for Incident reports, 911 call procedures.






Helping anywhere she is needed makes her happy and she is committed to the betterment of ERH in whatever form it takes.
