





An Extraordinary Gift for Sunshine Coast Hospice

Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary board members present Coast Hospice with a \$250,000 contribution towards the equipment of the first dedicated hospice on the lower Sunshine Coast. Our mandate is to enhance the quality of healthcare on the Sunshine Coast from Port Mellon to Egmont. Our members overwhelmingly voted to support this initiative that will give families a peaceful transition for their loved one. Mossy Rock is certainly a peaceful and tranquil location."

To prevent attendees from sitting too long, we incorporated coffee breaks and offered homemade goodies. We also hosted a well-received town hall, where each auxiliary highlighted its history and contributions.

A total of 58 attendees from 11 of our 14 auxiliaries participated. I encouraged each auxiliary to send a board representative and newer volunteers as a way to inspire engagement. I utilized both an online application form and a printed registration forms.

The majority of members registered online, and I manually added the few written registrations to our online system. The online system was easy to use and helped streamline attendee tracking, breakout room selections, and dietary accommodations. Overall, we had a great group of members from the Okanagan.

While I do not yet have the final financial tally, conference registration fees, the silent auction, and the involvement of mostly volunteer speakers all contributed to maintaining financial stability and helped us avoid a deficit. Our committee was proud of our efforts and received positive feedback from the evaluation forms with a few good suggestions for future conferences.

THE KASLO AUXILIARY CELEBRATES ITS HISTORY

Victorian Hospital of Kaslo Auxiliary Society





Early VHKAS history. February 7, 1902: twenty-one enterprising ladies of Kaslo formed the Kaslo and District Committee of the Victorian Order of Nurses of Canada, for the purpose of getting a hospital in their city of 6000 souls. Membership rose to sixty and in October 1903 their new hospital was opened. It was the first VON hospital built in Canada and cost \$5000. Money was raised to help furnish the hospital by donations, concerts, fancy dress balls and ever-reliable raffles. There have been tough times over the years, times when Kaslo has been without a hospital, but never without a Ladies Aid (Auxiliary). Kaslo and the Auxiliary have undergone many changes. The auxiliary, once peaked at 149 members, has held steady at about 25 for about thirty years. It has a new name, the Victorian Hospital of Kaslo Auxiliary Society (VHKAS), and also has registered charity status. The spirit of the Ladies Auxiliary remains strong and Kaslo responds generously by supporting teas, fashion shows, raffles, silent auctions, bake sales and the thrift store that was opened in 2002. In order to make money for the Activity Dept. for the Residents now living at the hospital, it was decided to have a Garage Sale on the front lawn at the hospital. Donations came from the community, Auxiliary members and the hospital staff. The Sale was a great success with lots of stuff left over. The left over was moved into the basement under the new wing, of the hospital. We decided to try to sell the leftover merchandise another Saturday. This led to the idea of a Thrift Shop. The income from the Thrift Shop was used for activities for the Residents. The Thrift Shop was run first by the Residents Council and then, since the ladies of the hospital auxiliary did all the work and ran the shop, it was eventually taken over by the hospital auxiliary. The auxiliary continues to this day to contribute to the Activity Department and maintains VCHC gardens. The Basement was eventually needed for the Primary Health Care Clinic, so the Thrift Shop had to move! The only place available at that time was the Old Fire Hall. On November 13, 2003, the Village authorized the lease for the old Fire Hall at their regular meeting. We had a new Home!! Many auxiliary volunteers helped clean and prepare for our Grand Opening. Many renovations have occurred to the property since VHKAS took occupancy. The Thrift Shop has been a great success. It has become a thriving business and a vital part of our community. As always funds raised are for extras that the hospital, renamed in 2003 the Victorian Community Health Centre (VCHC) of Kaslo, would otherwise have to do without. VHKAS is now contributing over \$20k annually to the health and wellbeing of Kaslo. All goods in the store are donated, and all labour is done by volunteers.
